Intersectionality as a framework

The need to consider the **differences** between women's experiences by black feminists and feminists of colour in the United States (Anzaldúa, 1987; Davis, 1983; hooks, 1984; Moraga and Castillo, 1988).

The emergence of the concept **intersectionality**.

The concern about **static** and **stable categories**.

The proposal of **feminist new materialism**: categories cannot be thought of as isolated but in a relationship of interdependence and mutual constitution.

Scene 1 - El Til·ler (Secondary School)

I don't go out in the neighborhood much. Sometimes I'm afraid to go out alone because there are people who... I don't know, it scares me. I go from here to home and from home to school.

(Long term migrant girl student, 15 years old)

Fear becomes "a determining factor in the use and experience of public space, since it directly affects young girls' access to the city and their spatial mobility" (Rodó, 2015, p. 5).

Scene 2 - I.E Pepa Colomer (Primary and Secondary School)

I can't have the same expectations as you.

(Long term migrant girl teacher assistant - 25 years old)

Final ideas of intersectionality

Intersectionality as a framework to address the "interlayered realities and social inequalities in **migration contexts**" (Gregoriou & Christou 2011, p.27). An approach that **goes beyond monolithic** perspectives and **uniform** views

privileges and oppressions.

Onto-episte-methodology → intersectionality is always **contextual** and **situated**.

Each particular situation requires developing **what axes** enter into that "etc.".
